

FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK:



Created to be Brave. Created to be Authentic. Created to be Free. Created to be Disruptive. Created to be Disciples.

These were the 5 themes of the ELCA National Youth Gathering in New Orleans this summer. Our group of eleven got the opportunity to explore and live out these themes in worship, through listening to and discussing speakers, in interactive stations, and by serving.

During one of our Sunday worship services in August, our youth will get a chance to share more about those themes – and how those ideas encourage their lives of faith and discipleship. We'll share pictures and stories and amazing moments from the 5-day experience. We may even share a song or two (on video – they're great songs, but we're not up to any sort of performance level with them).

I encourage you to explore, too. To visit the ELCA National Youth Gathering website and watch one or more of the livestreams. Although the messages and music are aimed at youth, there are themes and ideas that can connect with any generation.

One of the speakers I really enjoyed spoke Friday night. Sally Azar is a young pastor in the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Jordan and the Holy Land. Ordained just last year, she was the first Palestinian woman to be ordained in the Holy Land and now serves a congregation in Gaza. She spoke passionately about her experience attending the ELCA Youth Gathering in the past and how that was part of her formation to be a pastor. But she was even more passionate about how we can be brave, authentic, free and disruptive disciples of Jesus, standing up for justice and flipping the tables of injustice, serving people in need and living as peacemakers even in the most challenging situations, like the one she and her people find themselves in Palestine.

I was so glad that our youth got to hear from her about how the Christian church in Gaza is working for peace and justice. But anyone who listens to her message will be inspired. If you want a recap of all of the themes in one speaker, I'd encourage you to listen to her.

One of my favorite experiences came during our day exploring the city. During a downpour, we dashed into a lovely little bistro in the French Quarter called Amelie's. It was on the fancy side with marble tables and art everywhere. But, they made room for us and we got to sit down to a lovely meal of muffaletta sandwiches, chicken and waffles with andouille gravy, salad made with local watermelon, and more. The food was delicious, but what will stick with me was our interaction with the server/proprietor. After all of our youth and adults had ordered and waited patiently and then eaten (with gusto and appreciation), each one handed back their empty plate with a sincere word of thanks. The server was visibly stunned by our youth's politeness and gratitude. She told one of our leaders that they had been worried about this week, thinking it would be the low point of the summer in terms of sales, but instead they'd had several groups like ours for both breakfast and lunch. And everyone had been enthusiastic to try new food, full of gratitude and incredibly well-behaved. This was the impression we made. As 16,000+ ELCA youth and leaders across New Orleans: enthusiasm, gratitude, willingness to support the local economy and learn about local culture, polite and engaged. We made a good impression. The youth from Good Shepherd made a good impression – as good an impression as NOLA made on them.

In fact, one day as we were walking, an older gentleman who was selling beads on the sidewalk approached me. I was all ready to politely decline purchasing anything from him, but he didn't want to sell – not to us anyway. Instead, he wanted to say thank you. "Thank you kids for all you're doing for New Orleans," he told me. "It means a lot."

And it meant a lot to me to hear that. It means a lot to me that you supported and sponsored our group to go to NOLA and have this incredible experience. Thank YOU for all of your prayers, your pumpkin-selling and buying, your generosity for the Youth Program, and for entrusting me and the other leaders with your kids. It means a lot.

All are welcome! Feel free to invite anyone who may be battling, recovering from, or has family or friends living with a cancer diagnosis.




Sunday, August 18, 3-5PM GSLC Fellowship Hall

UPDATE ON THE MISSION FUND AND **EL SALVADOR BUILD TRIPS** By Dean Olson

Many of you know that Good Shepherd last went on a Habitat for Humanity International build trip to El Salvador in 2019. Initiated by Jim Hack and Don Block in 2011, Jim subsequently led build trips to El Salvador for a decade. These annual efforts, typically to Santa Ana or Ahuachapan (both in the west), were curtailed due to Covid.

Habitat efforts in El Salvador shrank accordingly, with our annual on-the-ground Habitat leader, Francis Padilla, laid off for a time, along with nearly all her local Habitat co-workers.

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Finally, things have changed, and Fancis was re-hired. It would be more accurate to say things have started over, not resumed. The Habitat International staff in the USA has changed, with new people, new themes, new web pages, new procedures, and new requirements. The start-up of activities was announced in a Zoom session in April that I was required to attend as a prospective group leader.

Habitat created а contact list of interested groups and after about 9 weeks, I was interviewed online, introduced to the person leading the Thrivent Partnership, and given a long list of things to do including: obtaining CPR and first aid certification, reviewing group requirements to determine eligibility, describing our group history, filling out forms, and passing a background check. All these steps are in progress, and happily, Thrivent is again involved and will make a sizeable donation to Habitat El Salvador for each group trip made. In the past, this has been \$8000 per visit, but the new amount has not been announced.

Trip costs have increased considerably from about \$800 per person in 2019 (plus air

fare) to an estimated \$1600 per person in 2025 (plus air fare), and the group minimum size is 10, with 12 preferred.

In addition, travelers must be at least 18 years old, with no provision for minors. So, changes indeed.



It was in 2014 that we sent a Habitat work group to help dig out the foundation for Cristo Rey Lutheran Church in Santa Ana. At the time, Pastor Carlos Najera led the church build after serious earthquake damage of the original structure, and achieved backing from Habitat, which rarely deviated from building housing.

Ever since, we have supported Cristo Rey, and we are in frequent contact with Pastor Vilma Lopez, who runs a youth program out of the church for the desperately needy neighborhood.



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We continue to send funds for Pastor Vilma's Kids quarterly via donations passed through our Jim Hack Memorial Scholarship Fund. Pastor Vilma remarks, "Thank you from all the children, youth, and families at Cristo Rey in Santa Ana, El Salvador. It is hard to think what would happen to us were it not for your generosity to our ministries. We appreciate all your dedication and love to us. God bless you." A summary received in May 2024 from Pastor Vilma describes the annual activities that our donations to Cristo Rey Lutheran Church help support. Very bad weather resulted in damage to the church and neighborhood and some donations were no doubt spent on repairs, shelter, and food.

- January Shop for school supplies and bags
- February Deliver textbooks
- March Deliver school and sports uniforms
- April Provide a small fee so parents can pay the monthly cost at the school their children attend
- May Celebrate traditional harvest holidays with a day of food delivery and festivities for the children
- June Take students to buy shoes for school and sports
- July Take students to buy basic clothes such as dresses, pants, underwear, socks, etc.
- August and September Prepare for Independence Day and participation in parades

- October and November Beginning of Bible Schools in Church with artistic presentations by the children and young people; farewell to the school year with special costumes and events
- December Celebration of the Nativity of Our Lord Jesus Christ; food package deliveries to each young person and child to help their families.

Please continue to prayerfully support these vital outreach ministries. Consider traveling to El Salvador on a Habitat-Thrivent partnership build trip once everything, including funding, is in place. If you can, make a donation to the Mission Fund to support a build trip, or to Pastor Vilma's Kids, which goes directly to Cristo Rey. With some prayerful effort, we hope to revive our outreach commitment to El Salvador build trips so we can again go on a regular basis and make a big difference in working with Habitat for Humanity International to provide housing for families in need.
