FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK:


Creating Community

This past year the Central/Southern Illinois Synod, adopted a new vision statement, mission statement, and values statements — all of which informed a new set of priorities and goals. (Copies of all of these are posted near the office.) Among the goals and understandings reflected in that work was the shift from "congregation" to "communities of disciples." This was to reflect the growing



number or non-building-based communities that are still functioning as groups of disciples, following Jesus in love and service. But it also emphasizes that call for us to not just be "churchgoers" or "members of a congregation", but disciples – actively following Jesus.

As a community of disciples we call "Good Shepherd", we are <u>disciples</u>: we try to remain focused on Jesus and on his calling to us. We work to serve our neighbors, grow in our faith, worship our God, and advocate for the most vulnerable. We offer opportunities for prayer, for comfort, for strength in difficult times, and for folks to try to learn to talk to one another and hear one another's concerns.



As a community of disciples, we are also community. But what does it mean to be community together? Are we a loose gathering of like-minded people? Are we people who care for one another in times of need? Are we people who know each other — and seek to welcome and know others — more deeply?

The Bible describes Christian community as people who are bound together in serving Jesus and their neighbors, as people who weep

together and rejoice together, who complement each other's strengths for weaknesses, and who build each other up in love. This type of Christian community is never exclusive. It is always Spirit-led and Spirit-fed, formed by grace and re-formed through love and forgiveness. It is made up of beloved and imperfect people who are honestly seeking to grow in relationship with God and in service to neighbor.

None of this happens overnight; none of it happens automatically. Instead, the building of Christian community takes time, intentionality, and a little bit of willingness to share something of ourselves with one another.

The first step, of course, is simply building familiarity and finding connections. One way we can do that is through regular "Nametag Sundays" — the next of which will be August 17. We know folks don't want to wear nametags every week, but we're hoping that you're willing to try it out quarterly — each time with a little different twist and invitation. This time, we'll invite you to wear a nametag during and after worship. But after worship, we'll hand you a card or a piece of paper with a question on it and we'll encourage you to ask someone that question (and they'll ask you theirs). The questions won't be too overly personal but will give us fun prompts that can lead into deeper conversations.

I hope that you'll joyfully – or at least cautiously – participate. And hopefully, along the way, get to know each other a little bit better – all so that we can be that community of disciples following Jesus.





TABLE TALK PUB THEOLOGY GROUP Sunday, August 17, 6PM

Friends are welcome! No drinking is required, NA options available.



School supplies needed for each kit:


- 4 wide-lined or college-lined approx.

STORYBOOK, It's All about the kids

The Storybook team from Good Shepherd and St Matthew's Lutheran churches is active this summer continuing regular monthly visits to the Illinois Department of corrections facility at Danville, recording offenders as they read storybooks which are sent home to their children. The team has also been busy with outreach and assisting Lutheran Social Services of Illinois to expand the reading program to other Illinois correctional facilities.


June 27th a team consisting of Dan & Tori Corkery, Jill Quisenberry, and Bob Clark traveled to the LSSI facility in Sterling-Rock Falls to conduct training for nearly twenty Lutheran church members and LSSI staff who are preparing to start Storybook teams at IDOC facilities in Dixon and Pontiac Illinois. LSSI requested our help in training and providing hands-on tips to these new volunteers from Chicago and other areas of northern Illinois as they prepare to join the Storybook team.

Team volunteers have also provided speakers to outside groups. Recent team member speaking engagements include Urbana PEO Chapter FF, Sunrise Rotary, and Altrusa International of Champaign-Urbana. We're happy to talk about Storybook and share stories of

the impact we see from our monthly interactions. If you belong to a group that would be interested in a presentation on the Storybook message, let us know. The Storybook team is self-funded and welcomes the opportunity to share our story.

During our regular visits a team volunteer works with each offender to select a new storybook to read and mail home. The team selects and purchases a wide range of children's books to display allowing just the right book to be picked. At holiday times a Christmas or Easter themed book might be chosen, other times maybe a book about a hero to look up to, baseball, getting along with friends, or sometimes just an old favorite like Cliford the big red dog. Once the book is selected, another volunteer records the reading, the recording is burnt onto a CD and both are mailed to the child.

Because the teams' contact is with offenders, the chaplain, and staff, many of the stories we share focus on that interaction. We can share information about prison size, statics, recidivism, and the positive impact we can observe on those individuals, however, just as important if not more so is the impact on families, especially the child receiving the gift. A book sent home with Daddy's voice reading the story, a book that is sometimes read over and over at bedtime, and a message from Dad at the end saying "Listen to your mom, pay attention to your teacher at school, and I love you" can mean a lot. Anecdotally we've heard of kids taking their book and CD to school for Show & Tell and proudly saying "That's my Daddy reading to me". Our Storybook team's motto is **It's all about the kids** and comes from hearing offender's stories about what these books and recordings mean to their kids. During his earthly ministry, Jesus told us to Love the Little children. I believe Storybook is one way to show that love. "Bob Clark

What a Summer we are having and could have into early Fall.

What can **YOU** do to stay safe on **HOT DAYS**

- 1. Stay in air conditioning as much as possible
- 2. Drink more H2O than usual. **Don't wait until you're thirsty**. If you are on water pills, ask your provider how much you should drink
- 3. Take cold showers or baths to cool down
- 4. Do not engage in very strenuous activities and get plenty of rest
- 5. Check on a friend or neighbor and have them check on you
- 6. Keep up with your local news for health safety updates
- 7. **Seek medical care immediately** if you have, or someone you know, symptoms of heat related illness like muscle cramps, headaches, nausea or vomiting
- 8. Enter your zip code on the CDC Heat Risk Dashboard (<u>www.cdc.gov/heatrisk</u>)
- 9. Consider walking inside a mall or grocery store when hot outside

Older adults may find adjusting to sudden changes in temperature more difficult. Why? The likelihood of having a chronic medical condition can affect changes in the normal body response to heat. They are also more likely to take prescription medicines that affect the body's ability to control its temperature or sweat.
