FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK:



Arrivals

It's a trope of many movies: the driver standing with a hand-lettered sign, waiting at the arrival gate for the passenger to exit the airplane. Or, if it's a more personal scene, the family gathered with balloons and signs to greet the incoming person with hugs and celebration. Honestly, though, most of the times I've traveled, the only thing that has greeted me is a sea of people, all trying to make it to their connection or find their way to the baggage carousel or ground transportation.

I wonder, as we await the arrival of Jesus this advent, how we will greet him. Will we stand there stoically with a little sign: "Jesus". As if greeting the coming of our Lord is just another day's work. Will Jesus arrive and find no one waiting at all? No one watching or hoping or yearning to greet his advent among us.

Or, will Jesus arrive to greet folks who are waiting to greet him? Gathered, prepared already for celebration? Eager to see him again?

And even as I ask these questions, I'm also struck by two truths. One, no one knows when Jesus will return. We can be prepared to an extent, but that preparation isn't likely standing in a spot waiting for him. That preparation will be the work we do to bring about God's kingdom here on earth – the care we take for the poor, the justice we strive to bring to the oppressed, the healing we participate in for the hurting.

And two, Jesus is already here. Even as we await his arrival, even as we anticipate his return in glory, we also know that he is with us always, even to the end of the age, as he tells the disciples in the last verses of Matthew.

This advent, as we await the celebration of Jesus' birth, as we look for his coming again into our world, even as we work to anticipate his coming, may we also look around us and see signs of Jesus' presence here and now: in the breaking of the bread, in the Word spoken and heard, in the faces of the gathered community of saints, in the form of a stranger coming off of a busy airplane, and in all of the many least likely places our Lord might show up. Including a dusty manger.






Beginning in January, on the second Saturday of each month, presentations on various prayer forms will be available. The sessions will be free and no is registration required. You can come to any or all of the presentations.


We will once again have a delicious buffet provided by Piato Café. The program will include a tour of the new facilities, music, and a brief WELCA meeting.

HOW TO SEE YOUR PROVIDER SOONER

Having a hard time getting an appointment? IT'S NOT YOU – it's our health care system. Delays in scheduling medical visits are longer than they used to be. Consider these suggestions to better navigate the system and GET TREATED ASAP.

A big root of the problem: we don't have enough physicians in the U.S., 1/3 of those are 60 and over, and they are retiring in unprecedented numbers. We are expected to be short of as many as 124,000 physicians by the years 2034 says a recent study of the Association of American Medical Colleges.

8 WAYS TO BE SEEN MORE QUICKLY:

- 1. Start with your Primary Provider: They may have tricks up their sleeve to get you an appointment or find the best treatment for you.
- 2. Make a friendly call to the Doctors office: Front staff are the "guarders" of schedules. Asking if a nurse can call you sometimes helps. If there is still no answer try going directly to the department. Yes, you may have to stand in line.
- 3. Be honest about your concerns: There is a big difference in trying to get in for an annual physical vs a scary lump. Be vulnerable, let the receptionist know what's going on and the amount of stress it is causing you. Be calm yet honest.
- 4. Consider a new physician or their staff: Look at other physicians who

- may have availability and their quality if available. Also, many times a new physician can give an introductory visit.
- 5. Inquire if your Providers have a wait list: Share that you would be happy to come in if there is a cancellation Could they be put you on the list, or would they prefer you call back regularly?
- 6. Play the Odds: This may work, not sure. Make a visit with 2 doctors and see which one comes up first and take it. Example would be a dermatology appt and your primary too for an undiagnosed rash. Remember urgent and convenient care facilities are a nice way to get a quick opinion. Some have call ahead appointments.
- 7. Consider a telehealth appointment. This might be available in rural areas with few doctors. They can phone you or can chat over a video. This of course will not work for all health problems.
- 8. Monitor your "own system", for example a blood pressure sheet, or gastric problems sheet (listing time of day and food eaten). You can be your own Patient Advocate. Impressive when you can take these documented sheets to your next Provider visit, they know you are serious.

What is one thing you're deeply grateful for right now? Friends and family.

What about your work (volunteer or paid) is the most fulfilling to you?

It is a privilege to help families who are in need. I have never been hungry. I do remember my mother saving one egg each week so when we came close to pay day she could make her one egg cake as a treat. When I talk with the recipients of our food pantry, I feel privileged to have this opportunity to help on a one to one basis.

I enjoy meeting with the Cancer Support Group monthly. Why are you a part of this congregation?

GSLC reflects my values. The congregation was so welcoming when I came. I am not from Champaign and GSLC has helped me feel a part of the community.

What is a favorite memory you have here at GSLC? Walking in and being greeted at the door on my first Sunday by Sandy.

When I was to participate in Chancel Care for the first time, I approached Carol when she was cleaning after the service. She welcomed me and invited me to set up the altar the next week. I have always been grateful for her friendship.

Betsy is a Parish Nurse volunteer as well a a choir member. She always comes to women's meetings and encourages others to attend as well.

How long have you been a part of Good Shepherd? I became a member in 2013.

Following Jesus means service and compassion to all living things. I hope what I do at Good Shepherd and outside of the church is of meaning and benefit to others-whether it is holding the door for another, giving a driver grace for an error that they made or helping out where I can at Good Shepherd in the church pantry or Church Council. It's not that I am always mindful of these, but it is a goal to strive for. We are called as Christians to be empathetic and sympathetic and those are realized when we are of service to others.

What are you passionate about? How did you discover that passion?

When I joined Good Shepherd, I was very active with the Master Naturalist program of the U of I Extension. My first services at GSLC I was so happy that there was such emphasis on God's earthly creation. When volunteering out in the field and whether it is helping to control invasives or cultivating native plants, I see His creation everywhere—the soil, the plants, worms, the sky. We are to be good stewards of the land and to the people on His land.

You were recommended by a member of GSLC. Does that surprise you? What should people know about the community service work/work that you do?

Yes, I am surprised--I'm not one who likes too much attention. But I am also pleased since it gives me an opportunity to talk about the food pantry and what a wonderful service this is to our community. Periodically, I pack food from the pantry for a family who has been referred to us by Empty Tomb. When I contact the family member (usually a mom or grandmother), I get to hear a little bit about their family. Mom may tell me about the kiddos going to start school or what they like to eat (pizza-always). So, when I pack for that family, I think about what those kiddos might like and what mom might need to provide good, nutritious meals. It saddens me to know there are folks in our community who need help feeding their family because their Link card isn't sufficient to cover a month's food; but I am glad and feel blessed to be part of community who practice their faith in service to others through their donations of food and money. Periodically, I also shop for the pantry-mainly fresh produce, eggs, milk, etc. It is a great feeling to know that I am helping a family have good, nutritious food in their pantry and refrigeration.

What is one thing you're deeply grateful for right now?

If I can name only one thing, it is my husband, Topper. He is a great husband, father, and grandfather who has been by my partner for 50 years and as we say, "through thick and thin."

He always has time to greet, speak and listen to others. He also has a sense of humor and gets mine. He is unforgettable and I am proud to be his partner all these years. And my family is right up there but that's more than one-2 grown, married children and 4 grandchildren.

What about your work (volunteer or paid) is the most fulfilling to you?

That I am making a contribution, however, small it may be.

Why are you a part of this congregation?

It is a loving and generous congregation that strives to fulfil their Christian missions.

What is a favorite memory you have here at GSLC?

Dorothy, a longtime member who has since passed, taught me how to prepare the altar for communion. I felt so blessed to be able to contribute to a very important part of God's service--the Meal.


Who do you think we should know more about here at Good Shepherd? Who would you recommend that we interview/talk to?

I joined the church in 1979, so I've been a member for 46 years!!

What are you passionate about? How did you discover that passion?

I'm passionate about music and doing work that serves others. My passion came from my mother who spent her entire life volunteering through church and with the Girl Scouts and Boy Scouts. She loved classical music which was played on the radio in our home every single day. And both my parents sang in the church choir.

You were recommended by a member of GSLC. Does that surprise you? What should people know about the community service work/work that you do?

I am honored to have been recommended. I'm glad to be able to contribute to the church through my musical talents: I sing in the choir, ring in the bells choir, serve as a cantor, and lead in hymn singing at special services. In addition to my musical contributions, my volunteer work at Good Shepherd makes for a rather long list. I am currently a member of the Outreach Committee from which I serve as the coordinator for our Storybook Project and I help with the nativity walk, selling pumpkins, and I'm assisting Katrina to organize this year's Fall Festival. I also serve as a Food Pantry Packer, and for worship services I do chancel care and serve as a reader and a communion server.

How long have you been a part of Good Shepherd? 24 years

I think a journey or quest that is not always easy but is continuous and takes a real commitment and conscious effort to trust, learn, and help serve others.

What are you passionate about? How did you discover that passion?

Currently, genealogy and its fun discoveries- but what I'm most passionate about is being available to help family, friends, and community in different situations, and grateful that I'm able to do so.

I didn't realize it at the time, but the importance of being available started by watching my parents with older relatives. As a young child I remember thinking why do these old people keep showing up on Sunday's. Different couples would come on different Sundays when all my sister and I wanted was afternoon family time with our parents. My dad only had Sunday's off, and the mornings were spent at Sunday school and church- so afternoons went fast. But there'd they be these relatives, and more often than not it would be right before Sunday dinner which meant 12 noon or 12:30 at the latest. But as I got older, I saw what my parents already knew: How much those Sundays meant to my Great Aunts and Uncles who never had children of their own.

You were recommended by a member of GSLC. Does that surprise you? What should people know about the community service work/work that you do?

Yes. That it's easy to get involved whether you sign up or when something randomly happens when you are in the right place at the right time like helping a group of parents clean up a park where their children play of debris and garbage. Volunteering through our church food pantry, taking someone shopping or to an appointment is always appreciated when someone is in a difficult situation.

What is one thing you're deeply grateful for right now? My husband, John.

What about your work (volunteer or paid) is the most fulfilling to you?

Getting that quiet unexpected hug of genuine thanks from a child or receiving big smiles and warm handshakes of welcome like I did from a family that needed groceries. They were new to the states and struggling, and did not speak much English, but they had this inner happiness and peacefulness about them, and such gratitude for the basic items that I take for granted but was another week of survival for them. It was truly a gift to experience and something that I think of often.

Why are you a part of this congregation?

It's the closest Lutheran church to my house. Ha! just kidding but can be convenient when running late. When we moved to Champaign and started looking for a church, GSLC was going through a transition period. The pastor of many years had just retired and there was interim pastor's filling in. We kept coming back to visit GSLC because of Interim Pastor Harum's warmth and welcome towards us, but also the welcoming spirit of dedicated members that made our girls want to be a part of GSLC.

What is a favorite memory you have here at GSLC?

There are many, but this one involves a little boy named Harrison who was in my younger daughters' preschool age or kindergarten class. It was the children's Christmas program, and time for the smaller group of children to sing. Harrison gave it his all. His yelling singing voice reverberated throughout the sanctuary and his little face was as red as can be from effort. You couldn't help but laugh. He was committed and sang every one of the songs he needed to sing. The look on my younger daughter's face when Harrison first belted out that first word still makes me laugh to this day. Such a fun memory.

Do you know how GSLC'S, Donna Clark Food Pantry Program works?

Would you like to help in some way but not exactly sure how to do that or how to fit it into your schedule? Please see below how a food delivery is handled weekly and the options that could best suit your schedule.

GSLC DONNA CLARK FOOD PANTRY PROGRAM

empty tomb, inc., located in Champaign receives referrals from various social service agencies in town. They refer to GSLC and other participating churches, local community individuals or families who have a short-term emergency need for food that cannot be met by an agency.

When GSLC receives a food request from empty tomb, the parish administrative assistant (Traci) will contact the volunteers scheduled. A name, address, contact phone number, the number of people in the family, the circumstances of the need, and any allergies are given to the volunteers. This program provides a week's worth of groceries covering three meals per day to the person or family in need of help.

VOLUNTEER OPPORTUNITIES FOR WEEKLY FOOD DELIVERIES

1. Be a packer that bags groceries directly from GSLC's pantry, refrigerator, and freezer for a scheduled delivery volunteer that requests groceries be ready for pickup and delivery. The delivery volunteer will let the packer know the day and approximate time they can deliver the food. Once the scheduled packer has that information, they will contact the person in need of food, identify themselves as a member or friend of GSLC and explain that they are calling in response to a food request from empty tomb.

Once the initial contact has been made, decide on an agreed time to talk when the packer can be at the church. The packer will then let the person know what food and staple items are available on the pantry shelves, and in the refrigerator, and freezer. This has proven helpful for the individuals/families because they get a choice of items they need or want, and it keeps other items on the shelves for another to use. There is no waste. Once groceries are packed, contact the delivery volunteer to let them know the food is ready for delivery.

2. Be a food delivery volunteer willing to deliver food to an individual or family in need at their place of residence. You can bring a friend or spouse to help with the delivery or be partnered with another volunteer at GSLC. The scheduled delivery volunteer will contact the person at the number provided by empty tomb to schedule the delivery day and time and verify you have the correct address. When you arrive at your destination, call the number to let them know you have arrived. Once the groceries are unloaded ask if they would like to pray with you or say a prayer. If not – simply say, "Goodbye and God bless you."

Contact Traci to let her know the delivery was done. Let her know if there were any issues or concerns.

- 3. Partner with another food pantry volunteer because you want to know how to help an individual or family with their food request from start to finish. You or your volunteer will contact the person at the number provided by empty tomb and combine and follow the instructions for packers and delivery volunteers above.
- 4. If you are a Thrivent member, you can apply for a Thrivent card that can help towards purchasing food for food deliveries and stock pantry shelves.
- 5. Be a volunteer to help shop in bulk with other volunteers when food and non-perishables are running low. The extra help transporting items from the store to the church is always appreciated.
- 6. Donate food listed weekly in the shout out or the bulletin insert and place donated items in the baskets in the narthex or by the back double doors closest to the church office.
- 7. Donate monetarily online or to the church office and write food pantry in the memo if using a check.

The opportunity to help our neighbors, to share our bounty, is a worthy effort.

Food deliveries offer the opportunity to pray together, a friendly smile, or greeting which may be just as important as the food delivered.


