



Preaching, Teaching, and Reaching in Jesus' Name

FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK:



The early Christian church grew up in a time of turmoil – both political and natural. The people who followed the Way of Jesus not only dealt with wars and violence, natural disasters and petty, tyrannical rulers, but also had to navigate occasional persecutions because of their faith. In short, the 1st Century was not an easy time to be a Christian; nor was it an easy time to simply exist as a human – at least in the Roman empire.

Today, we also live in a time of turmoil. Wars and violence are in the news daily. A new natural disaster (sometimes caused by or exacerbated by human action) strikes every week. We see people suffering in our own communities, neighboring states, and around the world. We live with worry for our children and grandchildren, unsure of what the future might hold for them. We grieve as rights are removed for trans-siblings and for women and as people of color face greater and greater threats.

A daily scroll of social media becomes a minefield of pain and dis-information. Conversations become harder. We are tempted to turn it all off and just huddle in our houses under our covers and turn the music up to shut out the world. I don't think that's just me.

When the apostle Paul writes to early Christians, he writes to people who are most likely tempted to do the same: to keep to themselves, be only in their community, focus on being good people, and shut out the larger world.

Nice idea, but impractical. And even more so today. We don't really have the option of just tuning out and shutting off – not for long, anyway. As people of faith who care about the most vulnerable, we also have the calling to pay attention to injustices visited upon others and to stand up, reach out, and help where we can.

DEPART FROM EVIL, AND DO GOOD;
SEEK PEACE,
→ AND →
PURSUE IT.

PSA 34:14, KJV

One of the passages that I return to, time and time again, during these difficult days is Philippians 4:4-8. Paul writes to a troubled congregation living through troubled times. He speaks about struggle and death, and then says, in the next sentence: “Rejoice in the Lord always; again I will say, Rejoice.” Rejoice? In troubled times? How?

But Paul goes on: “Let your gentleness be known to everyone. The Lord is near. Do not be anxious about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God. And the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus. Finally, brothers and sisters, whatever is true, whatever is honorable, whatever is just, whatever is pure, whatever is pleasing, whatever is commendable, if there is any excellence and if there is anything worthy of praise, think about these things.”

For Paul, rejoicing (joy) is possible even during difficult times because 1) the Lord is near; 2) we can (and should!) bring our worries to God in prayer; 3) unlikely though it seems, we have good things to think about even amidst the bad things; and 4) the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard our hearts and minds.

When was the last time you thought about that line – the peace that surpasses understanding? What does that even mean? Peace that goes beyond our capacity to grasp it? Sure. But it also refers to peace that defies reality. Peace that, given everything else going on, doesn’t make sense for us to possess – except through the grace of God.

That peace – the peace that is God-given, that defies reality, that flies in the face of all of the horrible news and terrifying reports – is what is sustaining me right now. That doesn’t mean I’m not paying attention, praying, trying to help in what ways I can. But it does mean that, through the grace of God, my heart and mind can still find peace.

I truly pray that your heart and mind can find that same deep peace, too.

When we approach God with honesty and humility, and we admit that some things are too big for our hearts to bear, we will find there not a disapproving God but one who weeps with

us. We will find a God who can take our grief and disappointment and transform them into holy joy and renewed hope. We will learn, ultimately, that Jesus' death on the cross—the place to which the season of Lent leads us—is the reason we never mourn as those without hope. **Join us Wednesday evenings at 6:30 PM in the sanctuary.**

We cannot use worn towels, **all items should be new**. Walmart for towels and Dollar Tree for toenail clippers have been the best places. Yes, this is early for our shopping list, but it does give us plenty of time to purchase the needed supplies.

Here is what we need for each kit:



1 bath towel, dark color,
 not a bath sheet



toenail clippers



toothbrush, soft bristles



sturdy comb



2 bars of soap, 4 ounces each,
 individually wrapped (not boxed)

We try not to send materials in cardboard or heavy packaging to save on postage expenses. We will take off all packaging and stickers before we wrap the supplies for each kit together. Good Shepherd will continue to provide meals for 10-15 people on the **first Sunday of the month, and we are committed to the following dates:**

Feb 1, Mar 1, April 5 and May 3.

If you are interested in providing food for our friends at St. Andrew's let Agatha know! She can pick up items at Good Shepherd or stop by your house, if that is more convenient!

Here are the themes for the upcoming meals:

***February - Souper Supper!** One vegetarian soup and another type of soup, plus bread/rolls, salad and a dessert will be a great start.

***March - Backyard BBQ!** We will need hot dogs & buns, veggie burgers & buns, potato salad, & potato chips. Additional items like fruit, baked beans, veggies & dip or mac 'n cheese are welcome!

***April - Have a favorite casserole St. Andrew's can cook in the oven that you'd like them to try?** Two dinner casseroles (one vegetarian, please) and items to round out the meal would be fantastic!

***May - Breakfast for dinner!** Items to make waffles or pancakes (2 dozen eggs, pancake/waffle mix, milk, syrup, butter),

bacon and/or sausage, and fresh fruit.

Additional items like orange juice, cranberry juice, items to make a breakfast quiche (pie crust, egg beaters, diced veggies) will also be appreciated.

Items that need to be prepared will need to be ready for drop/pick up earlier in the week (by Wednesday), items that just need to be reheated in the oven or microwave can be ready for drop/pick up by 4:00 on Sunday.

COLLEGE CARE PACKAGES


Items will be collected February 1-15 and sent off to our college students on the 16th.

I'm very strong on supporting others who are hurting--either physically or mentally. I have no formal training in health care, but a lot of life experience in dealing with pain and loss. I lend a helpful ear, showing the sufferer that they are not alone.

You were recommended by a member of GSLC. Does that surprise you? What should people know about the community service work/work that you do?

It does surprise me that I was nominated for this recognition.

Many people have known me as the yard-work lady at Good Shepherd or St. Andrews. That was due to my volunteering in that capacity for over 30 years. Since I am now mostly unable to keep up the yard work, that has become a thing of the past. I do miss it.

What is one thing you're deeply grateful for right now?

I am deeply grateful that right now, my lord has blessed me with relief from heart issues for which I've suffered for 27 plus years. This blessing can be temporary, but still, I am deeply grateful.

What about your work (volunteer or paid) is the most fulfilling to you?

Fulfilling things from my past work at Good Shepherd were serving on Church Council (recording secretary) and serving several years as WELCA treasurer. Both were very educational and gave me great opportunities to serve. Singing in the choir (with at least four directors), was so rewarding and fun.

Why are you a part of this congregation?

I am a Good Shepherd member because I met a long-term Good Shepherd member, attended services with him, learned about Lutheranism, and changed my church membership from a Baptist church in Olney to Good Shepherd.

What is a favorite memory you have here at GSLC?

A favorite memory at Good Shepherd is our wedding in 1992. Our pastor was Edward Schneider.
