FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK:

All are Welcome

Every week in worship, in tons of our social media posts, on our signs outside, we declare that all are welcome. But so do lots of churches. Is it a tagline? Or is it the truth?

In reality, humans are not very good at being universally welcoming. Tribalism, prejudice, fear, insularity, envy, habit... all of these things stop us from offering the wide welcome we want to. Paul, in his letter to the Romans, Chapter 7, has his own way of explaining it. He says, in effect, "I decide one way, but then I act another, doing things I absolutely despise. ... I obviously need help! I realize that I don't have what it takes. I can will it, but I can't do it. I decide to do good, but I don't really do it; I decide not to do bad, but then I do it anyway."

The answer, thank God, for Paul – and for us - is Jesus Christ.

When we say all are welcome – what we mean is that Jesus welcomes everyone. Everyone – without regard for skin color, language, sexual orientation, gender identity, age, neuro-diversity, income. Everyone – sinners and saints, folks who do good and folks who don't do good as often as we'd like and folks who struggle to find the good at all. Our welcome may not be perfect, but Jesus' is. Our welcome may not always be as wide as we want it to be, because our own stuff gets in the way – but Jesus' welcome is.

Which means I, with my own prejudices and faults and blind spots, am welcome here. And you are welcome, too. Just as you are. Because Jesus welcomes you. And that's not a tagline. It's the truth. Thanks be to God.

New this summer: BREATHE, a summer evening worship, once a month, on the front lawn. This quiet time with God (and each other) will feature prayer and scripture and run from 7–8 PM.

We may or may not have music, depending on whether we find a musician or not. Bring a lawn chair and a cool beverage. Relax and breathe in God's presence.

All are welcome! Invite your friends. Our gatherings will continue the last Sunday of the month through September.

New Communion Option

The Lutheran teaching has always been that we receive the whole benefit of the sacrament – forgiveness, salvation, communion with God, eternal life, Real Presence, etc. – in and under and through just the wine or just the bread. However, for reasons of welcome and inclusion, we've also been offering gluten-free wafers (rice-based) and grape juice for folks who can't have the bread or the wine for health or personal reasons. This practice has been in place at Good Shepherd for years now.

Recently, though, we have also come to know that or those with Celiac Disease or other restrictions that go beyond gluten-free. One option is for those folks to receive only the wine and to not have the bread or wafers. However, that can feel exclusionary. Starting in August, therefore, we will also be offering a grain-free wafer made from cheese to those who need it. We're still working on logistics, but our servers will be able to direct folks with dietary restrictions to the wafer that best feeds them. We will use this practice for at least one year and re-evaluate at that time whether it is still fulfilling a need.

While this may feel like a departure from the strict biblical image of bread and wine, it is also good to remember that Jesus was using the items set out before him as part of the Passover meal and that early Christian communion included lots of different foods – including honey, and cheese! (Didache, p.) It was only in later practice that communion became focused on the bread and wine.

We will continue to offer bread and wine as the primary elements for communion; however, we will also continue to reform and re-examine our practices so that they are both faithful and inclusive.



LOVING HOME – Exploring Ethics for the Environment

Adult Faith Formation – Summer 2026

While our usual “Adult Forum” takes a break over the summer, you are invited to a different kind of faith formation experience. We will explore a different facet of ethics for the environment most weeks. The content is provided through faith+lead – a lay theological education resource out of Luther Seminary, Minneapolis.

Pastor Lynette Chapman will facilitate, and all participants will have their own resource book and student journal. You do not have to attend all sessions to meaningfully participate. Neither do you need any other pre-requisite! Learners of all levels are welcome!

This class will be held Sundays at 10:15AM in the choir room/meeting room across from the office.

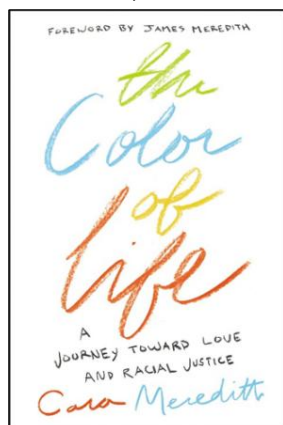

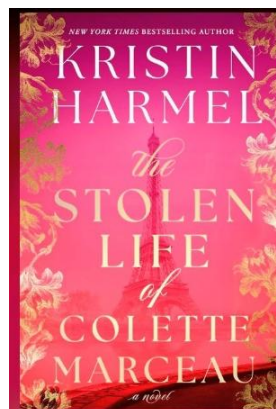
This is a personal journey, thoughtfully told, that invites us all to consider our own history and understandings and engage in a shared and loving movement toward greater racial justice.

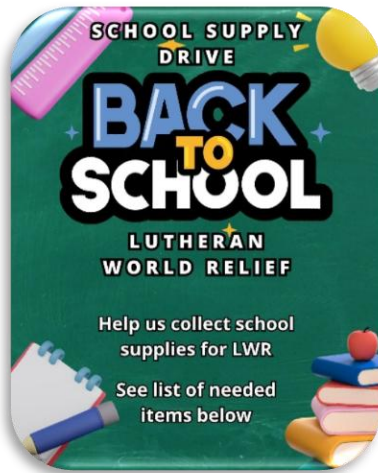

SCHOOL SUPPLIES FOR LUTHERAN WORLD RELIEF

WELCA is collecting school supplies for LWR school kits from **now until August 2** and packing them up this fall. School supplies needed for each kit:

- 4 wide-lined or college-lined approx. 8 x 10.5 inch spiral notebooks, 70 page count (no loose leaf paper)
- 5 black or blue ballpoint ink pens (**no gel pens**)
- 1 box of 16 or 24 regular crayons
- 1 pair of child-safe blunt scissors
- 1 2.5 inch eraser
- 1 pencil sharpener
- 1 plastic or wooden 12 in. long ruler marked in inches and centimeters
- 5 **unsharpened** #2 plain wooden pencils with erasers

Social Ministry, Justice, and Advocacy Committee

The Social Ministry, Justice, and Advocacy Committee (SMJA) is a standing committee of the Central/Southern Illinois Synod. The primary responsibility of the SMJA Committee is to review and award grant applications from communities of disciples (congregations). Our Synod has budgeted \$6500 for projects that encompass a wide range of social justice and advocacy ministries. Typically the grants awarded are in the \$500-\$1,000 range.

Examples include:

- St. Andrew's Lutheran Campus Center, Champaign, began a Bus Stop Ministry. Grant money was used to offer coffee and a pastry to students and others waiting at the bus stop in front of their building. With stickers, bookmarks, and a listening ear, the message of God's love through Jesus was made real at that bus stop.
- Immanuel, Minonk, sponsors a youth program which already provides a meal for the youth. However, they decided that they would also educate youth in the basics of nutrition and meal preparation, helping youth plan nutritious meals.
- Grace Lutheran, Springfield, used grant funds for the operation of their Food Pantry, which in 2024 had 10,000 visits representing 25,000 individuals.
- Resurrection Lutheran, Godfrey, operates a Seeds of Grace and Growth Community Garden. The garden has provided over 1,200 pounds of produce to individuals and families experiencing food insecurity. Additional flowering plants near the garden offer beauty, welcome, and emotional restoration alongside practical learning for women and children from the nearby Oasis Women's Shelter.
- Our Saviour Lutheran in Normal received some funds for the Little Free Food Pantry Expansion. For the last two years, this pantry has served neighbors who live in the low-income housing apartments nearby, the budget motel next door, travelers, and transients. They plan on providing toiletry items, hosting an open house with a free meal available, and having more Cross+Generational participation.
- Christ Lutheran in Quincy received grant funds for an Indian Boarding School Book Discussion. The Truth & Healing Working Group will host a two-session community book discussion on "Medicine River: A Story of Survival and the Legacy of Indian Boarding Schools". This project supports the ELCA's Truth-Telling and Truth-Seeking Initiative, calling congregations to honestly engage the history of Indigenous peoples in North America, the church's complicity in that history, and the ongoing work of reconciliation and healing.

The recently elected SMJA Chair is GSLC member Al Mytty.

ELCA SUMUD

Sumud, an Arabic word for “steadfastness” is used by Palestinian theologians to describe nonviolent resistance to occupation through advocacy, education, social work, and faith-rooted presence. Sumud is the ELCA’s programmatic response to occupation and injustice in Palestine and Israel. Freed by the transformative life of Christ, the ELCA is committed to accompaniment, advocacy, and awareness-raising with Palestinian partners in the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Jordan and the Holy Land (ELCJHL), the only Lutheran church in the Middle East, whose ministries in education, health care, justice, and leadership are vital to Palestinian society.

Just this week, we learned of the arrest and imprisonment of Natalie Abudayyeh. Natalie comes from a Lutheran family and is a member of the ELCJHL Youth. She is a graduate of Talitha Kumi school in Beit Jala, and a very active member of her church. She played on the National Soccer team for Palestine and recently began studies as a journalism student at Birzeit University. She, along with four other Palestinian young adults, was arrested by the Israeli Defense Force (IDF). Imprisonment without charges is common in Palestine, with over 9,000 Palestinians held in Israeli prisons.

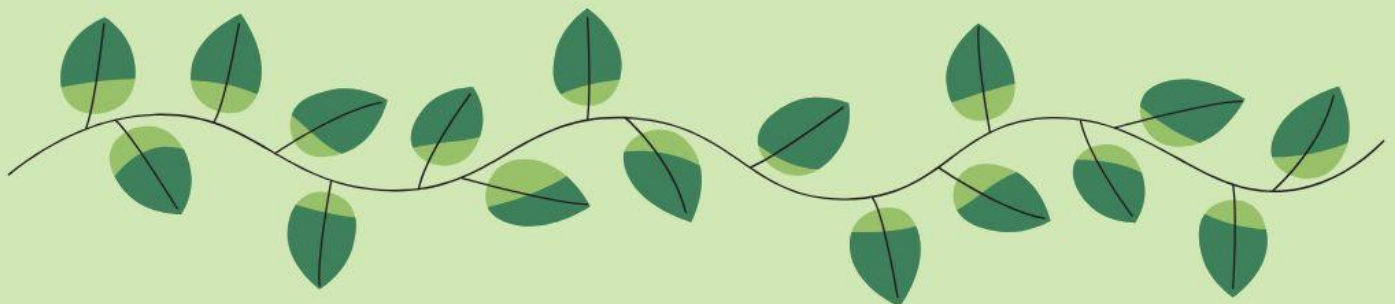
The ELCA Sumud network is advocating for her safety and prompt release. You can help advocate for her and for justice in Palestine by signing up for ELCA Action Alerts and receiving newsletters about Sumud for Justice in Palestine and Israel.

Through the ELCA Bishops, ELCA Sumud has a network of twenty synods with Sumud Ambassadors, who serve as leaders and liaisons in their synods. GSLC member, Al Mytty is the Sumud Ambassador for the Central/Southern Illinois Synod.

We are all Sumud, accompanying our Palestinian partners and following their lead as we bear witness to the truth that only when justice prevails can there be lasting peace for all Palestinians and Israelis. Please join this call for justice and advocacy.

HEALTHY KIDS, HEALTHY COMMUNITIES: ARE WE AS PARENTS AND GRANDPARENTS ENABLED TO HELP?

How can we make a difference in their lives and in their communities?

Our job is to prepare children to be adults who are capable of taking care of themselves and overcoming difficulties. It's not an easy job. Parents must set appropriate limits, watch their children fail and let them feel the consequences of their actions. I am sure you have heard of the word ...

Bullying: can include mean words, teasing, spiteful pranks, the spreading of false rumors, name-calling, the taking of personal items, exclusion from social groups and events, graffiti scrawled on a locker, pushing and shoving, harassment, threats, and in its worst form, physical violence. Bullying is repetitive, not just a single act of aggression. Kids who are bullied often withdraw socially, begin to underperform academically, feel anxious, sleep badly, and may eventually become depressed and feel trapped if the bullying goes on long enough.

Another term we hear is a Helicopter parent or the opposite, letting a child fly the helicopter themselves. Parents and grandparents can help in this way by providing guidance and setting limits and yet allow some choice or autonomous decision-making.

Just remember it is a difficult job being a parent but also great to have this privilege.

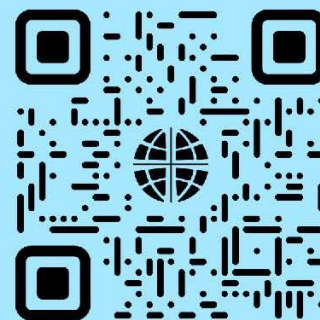
