FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK:



What comes to your mind when you think of an oasis? A lush, green grove of palms and grasses surrounding a picturesque watering hole in the middle of an arid landscape of desert and sun and scrub?

Or do you think of a highway oasis? Circle K or Bucky's or the odd collection of fast-food restaurants perched above or along an Illinois toll road?

Either way, we come to understand oases as stopping points along our journeys where we can be hydrated, stretch our aching muscles, and just take a break from the road.

Oases are sources of life for the people of the desert. Trucker's oases are sources of life for long-haul drivers. Bucky's is well, Bucky's.

This Lent, our journey takes through some arid landscapes of faith. It starts in the wilderness of temptation and ends in the wilderness of the cross. But, in between, there are oases of God's promises and grace. We will hear about God's covenants with God's people. We will listen to God's promises of rebirth from above, and the resurrection of the seed. We will be reminded of our callings and identity. Every Sunday, as we gather for worship, we'll hear stories of our faith that will be like ice-cold sodas plucked from the highway oasis fridge, refreshing us and energizing us for what yet lies ahead. At the oasis Jesus provides, we'll be renewed, healed, and strengthened for the work we do of loving our neighbors as God first loved us.

You may have noticed that the font in the sanctuary has been surrounded by green plants this Lent. This is a visual reminder that the font is a place of life in the barrenness of the Lenten landscape. When we remember our Baptism, we are refreshed. When we come to the font, we remember that we are beloved. When we live out our baptismal identity, we find our purpose and calling. The font becomes both our oasis during worship and our reminder of the oases God provides daily in our lives.

This Lent, I invite you to the oasis. I invite you to have your thirst quenched by Living Water, to have your sins washed away in the waters of grace, to dip your fingers in a tangible reminder that you are God's beloved child, and to be refreshed and renewed for your Lenten journey.




PALM SUNDAY BRUNCH Sunday, March 24

COMMUNITY OUTREACH



GSLC DIAPER DRIVE Sunday, March 3 10AM-Noon & 4-6PM

Good Shepherd's outreach committee is sponsoring a diaper drive. This planned event is to collect diapers for distribution by empty tomb to families who need assistance in providing a basic need for their children. Surveys show some young families may spend up to \$100 a month for diapers.

Families with children find this cost overwhelming and can place low-income households in the position of choosing between diapers and other necessities like food and medicine. Remember last summer we partnered with The Champaign Sunrise Rotary who rented a storage unit and conducted a weeklong diaper drive in our parking lot. Over 21,000 diapers were collected and donated to United Way of Champaign County for distribution throughout the community. Rotary volunteers were joined by Good Shepherd members in the collection effort. An event of this size is not planned in 2024.

For our campaign this year, there will be a familiar Red Chevy pickup parked in the front parking lot and our goal is to STUFF OLD RED with many boxes of size 5,6, or newborn diapers. Other sizes will gladly be accepted but those are the most common sizes requested.

One box donated by your family may not solve all the world's problems, but it will mean a lot to a young family, and it will mean the world to a baby in need.

Please join in and bring a box of diapers to church March 3rd and help fill Old RED. If you would rather donate monetarily, make check payable to GSLC with outreach on the memo line and a committee member will gladly shop for you. Thank you for considering this worthy cause. Your generous spirit is appreciated.


On February 23, I closed on my house. That wouldn't have happened without the help you gave me sorting, packing, and hauling away my stuff.

FROM THE DEACON'S DESK:



As I reflect on the last 16 years serving at Good Shepherd, I can't help but think of all the games we have created or played together. We've had Newlywed Game Shows, Trivia Nights, and Vacation Bible School programs. Students and I have made and played games based on the life of Abraham and the book of Acts with each reminding us that we are called by God and sent out. Not only has this church been a safe space for us to pray and play together, but is has also modeled for me a people who listen to God's call and are sent out.

Sometimes that call is to respond to those affected most by natural disasters like flooding and earthquakes, in which case we have served together in places like Biloxi, New Orleans, Houston, and El Salvador. Sometimes the call is to respond to feeding kids in our schools, or visiting those in prison, or delivering furniture to those in need, or sorting clothes for those who can't afford even a t-shirt. If you look at a list of the things Jesus did, most churches pick one activity and really focus on it, we seem to want to have a hand in doing all the things Jesus did!

I think this is a blessing because it provides more opportunities for people to use the unique gifts God has given them to serve others. Good Shepherd has always been, and continues to be,

a place where God's people respond to the needs of a hurting world because of our love for Jesus Christ.

This love for Jesus has overflowed in all of us and has been poured out by the Holy Spirit through Nativity Walks, Fall Festivals, Outdoor Movie nights, Coffee Houses, and Game Nights. We have welcomed countless groups to use the building God has blessed us with and that has allowed so many people in our community to feel welcomed. My prayer for Good Shepherd, as it has been with Youth Ministry, is that we always create space for people of all ages to be seen and heard so that through our loving attention they experience God's love to be real and transformative. God continues to do amazing things through this church as long as it gathers around the table to be fed and forgiven by Christ, to hear God's word, and to sing the praises of our Creator.

May you continue to be called and sent out, may you be brave in responding to the needs of a hurting world, and may the love and attention you share in the name of Jesus transform hearts and lives in the most creative and playful ways.


