FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK:



Embracing a "Buy Nothing" Lent

Lent begins next week. Each Lent, Christians are called to "a discipline that contends against evil and resists whatever leads us away from love of God and neighbor." These disciplines include "self-examination and repentance, prayer and fasting, sacrificial giving and works of love." (Invitation to Lent, part of Ash Wednesday liturgy)

One of the members of our congregation recently told me that she is trying to embrace a 'buy-nothing' year in 2025. This can mean different things. For most, a buy-nothing period means that they pledge

to purchase nothing beyond necessities — food, fuel, toiletries, etc. — and only then after considering whether they actually need it or not. This means no Amazon shopping, no new clothing, repairing things instead of replacing them, using the old phone another year, etc. It can also mean cancelling or paring down subscription services, not going to the barber or hairdresser as often, and not going out to eat. For some people "buy-nothing" means participating in a gift-economy instead — where participants build community and trade and barter and gift everything — up to and including food — and money is not used unless there is no other choice.

Generally, though, most people who attempt to "buy-nothing" still use money and still purchase needs, but they are more considered about it, committing to buy less and only purchase necessities. The hope is that participants examine their spending habits, become less addicted to consuming, even rethink our consumeristic society, reduce their impact on the environment, and perhaps even end up with a little more cash to either save or share with someone who doesn't have enough.

Reading and digging into these ideas, I am inspired. So - I am challenging myself to a buynothing Lent. For 40 days, I pledge to purchase nothing that I don't need. And I'm not going to stock up early, either! No new clothes, shoes, or accessories or yarn. No new books (this is the

hard one for me – much harder than clothes, etc.) If I want to read a book – library. Or my To-Be-Read shelf. Or re-read one I already have. Or swap one with a friend. Examine my subscription services and unsubscribe from any I don't use at least once a week. Make presents instead of purchasing them. Make cards or write handwritten notes to loved ones. I'm sure I'll think of other things along the way, but this is my starting place.

For me, this 'buy-nothing' pledge echoes several of the calls to Lenten discipline. It is definitely a fast. I am fasting from consumerism; fasting from the easy purchase on Amazon; fasting from satisfying my wants and confusing wants and needs. Of course, it is also self-examination. How much do I really need to purchase? What is necessary and good and what is not? What is my relationship with purchasing? Is it healthy or unhealthy? Where are the places where I spend because it's easier than being creative or reusing something I already have? Along the way, this discipline may also lead me to repentance — a change of life away from something life-stealing towards something life-giving. It may also lead me to think about how my consumption habits — and the consumption habits of our society — harm workers around the globe as we seek cheap goods, damage God's precious creation, and contribute to systems of injustice. And, of course, any money I save can be used to help others — the sacrificial giving and works of love.

I don't know if any of these things will lead me closer to God. I hope so. Because too often, thoughtless consumption makes us our own gods, living to satisfy our own wants before considering others' basic needs. Therefore, examining our consumption patterns can truly be a spiritual practice, teaching us about God's providence, about caring for neighbor, about what really matters in our lives.

This Lent, I challenge you to your own "buy-nothing" discipline. What might that look like in your life? What might it change for you? What insights will you gain? In the end, I hope that we who take up this challenge will discover new ways to enjoy the life our Creator intended: a life free from the chasing after of things — a life freed to serve our neighbor.




MARCH 2 - FASNACHT PANCAKE BRUNCH

Mark your calendars, invite a friend, sign up on the list in the narthex or by calling the office, and join us for this special Saturday of learning new ways to connect with God through prayer.




TABLE TALK*


Friends are welcome! No drinking is required, every place we go will have NA options. We will be using conversation prompts from pubtheology.com.


