

GSLC FOOD PANTRY FUND GETS A NEW NAME

At the October Outreach meeting a proposal to rename the Church Food Pantry Fund was received, considered, and approved by the outreach committee. It was then sent to the church council for consideration and the motion passed. Church Food Pantry Fund will now be named: **Donna Clark Food Pantry Fund**

As you'll read below, Donna was instrumental in growing our church food pantry to where it is today.

GSLC ARCHIVE INFORMATION REGARDING GSLC FOOD PANTRY MINISTRY

GSLC archives information on our food pantry indicates its earliest beginning in December 1976, when Church Council minutes make mention of a report by Jeretta Hecht of a new organization in the community with the name, empty tomb. Later, Administrators, John and Sylvia Ronsvale visited Good Shepherd and encouraged our partnering with empty tomb, inc. by delivering food to residents in need.



We started a modest program in early 1981 calling it "Loaves & Fishes." Donna Clark was one of the earliest food delivery volunteers. It

appears we did not have a pantry but collected small baskets of food and then purchased groceries prior to making deliveries. Little mention of this program was made in archived records for several years other than a line in the annual report.

During 1987, a substantial renewal of the effort and growth of the pantry was shown. Steve Nesbitt was chair of the Service Committee and makes mention of Donna's work. In the 1990 annual report, Donna Clark is identified as coordinating the food program, finding volunteers, receiving calls and from empty tomb, scheduling volunteers to deliver weekly food. Similar reports of Donna's leadership are listed in Service Committee reports in subsequent years by later Service Chairs, Sue Eagan and Cheryl Austin.

It appears starting in 1987, when the food pantry was being more established, the delivery program was ramped up. Donna did the coordinating that Parish Admin. Asst. Traci now does with empty tomb, and she recruited volunteers as Patty Hart & Bob Clark do. She made up the food delivery schedule that Traci handles, cleaned the pantry, checked food expiration dates, went shopping and made food deliveries.

During this time the pantry was enlarged, expanded, and a refrigerator/freezer space was added. Our 100 plus families-a-year delivery program of today had its beginnings in the work done back in the early nineties by Donna Clark. Donna stayed very active with the Service Committee - especially the food pantry - until her health failed.




January Book


WELCA BAKE SALE THANK YOU

FROM THE DEACON'S DESK:

On my sabbatical journey out west, I was able to view some artwork at a visitors center near the Grand Tetons by Chicago based artist Chris Pappan. Pappan is a citizen of the Kaw (Kanza) Nation and of Osage, Lakota, and European descent. Next time you are in Chicago I encourage you to visit his new open workspace called The Center for Native Futures. One of the things I love about Pappan's art is he takes items that may have represented painful moments in his people's history, and he redeems them by making art out of them.

One particular style comes from the tradition of ledger art which thrived among Native peoples who called the Great Plains home between 1850 to 1920. Pappan shares that; "The mid-19th Century was a tumultuous time for the Indigenous peoples of America; the doctrine of Manifest Destiny brought deep pain and suffering but it also introduced new modes of expression."

Since November is National American Indian Heritage Month it may be an appropriate time to reflect on this devastating part of our history. As a people of God called 'the church' we know that November is also the month that we celebrate All Saints Sunday. It is a time to look to our ancestors, not only to what they taught us, but also to see them as present with us and still guiding us in the faith. We will have readings like this one from Revelation 7:9:

"After this I looked, and there was a great multitude that no one could count, from every nation, from all tribes and peoples and languages, standing before the throne and before the Lamb, robed in white, with palm branches in their hands." Vol. 57, No. 11

Ancestors we didn't even know we had are gathered together giving God glory. On All Saints Sunday we may look at pictures of our loved ones and remember their lives offered in service to God. My hope is that the things our ancestors inspire in us don't stay stuck in the pain of the past, but instead are unleashed with ever greater acts of love and healing through Jesus Christ. Each month I will continue to highlight in the Scroll ways that we can continue to learn about Indigenous peoples and the pain of our collective past, so that God's salvation work can bring us into abundant life together.

I will leave you with these words from Artist Chris Pappan: "Our people believe that our ancestors are always with us and watching over us. I think that's very important. In a lot of my work, I try to honor our ancestors in that way. I'm always looking at old photographs, and I feel like I'm communicating directly with them. Whether they're my direct ancestors or indirect ancestors, that's really special... I don't want it to stay in the past. It's about the present and the future, as well."

COVID UPDATE

We have come a long way from the pandemic-era levels, however with cooler weather and more indoor living remember these facts and concerns.

1. CDC recommends someone who tests positive for COVID should isolate for 5 days and stay home. The day refers to the time you had the symptoms. You can end the 5 days as soon as you are symptom free. If

symptoms linger wait until they have markedly eased.

2. If you have been exposed to someone with Covid 19, begin testing 3 days after the exposure and test for the next 2-3 days.

3. If you need to wear a mask or wish to, recommendation is the N95 masks.

4. Time errands in low-traffic time of day.
Stay away from large crowds when possible.
5. Don't spend time in close quarters for both you and the vulnerable individual.

6. Anyone who tests positive for the COVID 19 virus and is at high risk, such as the elderly or have a compromised condition, should contact their health care provider.

7. Antiviral medications such as Paxlovid have been shown to significantly reduce the risk of hospitalization and death.

The best way to lower your risk of COVID-19 is get vaccinated. The recent vaccine released, has proven to be effective against the coronavirus and of its variants. GET VACCINATED. If it has been 4 or more months since your last booster receive that shot. And your FLU shot too. Have a healthy happy winter.

WHAT IS RSV?

RSV (Respiratory syncytial virus) is a contagious virus that usually causes mild symptoms but can severely affect the lungs in older adults.

- 1. Adults aged 60 and older are at risk for severe RSV infections that may lead to hospitalizations.
- 2. Adults with certain underlying like conditions asthma. chronic pulmonary obstructive disease (COPD) and congestive heart failure (CHF) are also at increased risk of hospitalizations from RSV.

Check with your primary care provider if you have any questions.
