FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK:

On Big Cats and Little Invitations

A couple of weeks ago, my husband and I did a mini road-trip to Terre Haute, Indiana. We do these occasionally. We take a day off and drive somewhere within a couple of hours, explore things there and along the way, visit lesser-known parks and museums, eat local food, and enjoy both the scenery and the time together. Terre Haute may not seem like the ideal destination for a road trip, but it is close to the attraction we were most interested in seeing: The Exotic Feline Rescue Center.



What can I say? We like cats. We like conservation. We like people who are trying to make a difference in the lives of wild animals. We didn't know exactly what we would find. It could have been depressing or disturbing. But it wasn't. These big cats (mostly tigers, but also a couple of lions, mountain lions, leopards, and other smaller species) were well cared for. They were housed in large habitats and treated with both (distanced) affection and deep respect. The keepers were knowledgeable and thoughtful in how they explained the sometimes sad histories of the animals. All in all, it was a moving and educational experience. And, if you like big cats, I'd recommend you check it out yourself.

That was easy, wasn't it? I have now told you a true story of a personal experience and invited you, if you are interested, to check it out yourself. And maybe you disapprove of keeping any kind of animal in a cage or wouldn't travel to Indiana if I paid you. But, generally speaking, you'll keep that to yourself and even if you told me, we could agree to disagree. After all, my experience is still valid, even if you don't want to share it.

But what if we applied this same scenario to inviting people to know Jesus? Or to come to worship at Good Shepherd? Or even just to come to buy their pumpkins in our parking lot? That can seem more intimidating, can't it? We are fine telling others about our experiences at a new

restaurant or about a fascinating museum we stumbled across, but we're sometimes reluctant to talk about our church.

But, when we tell folks about our church, we can speak from our own experience: "I love my church." "I feel like I'm with real people who are trying to make a difference." "I've made really good friends there." "Our pastor is a decent preacher and keeps her sermons fairly short." "The music always lifts my heart." Whatever is true for you, you can share it. You can tell your story and invite others to check it out themselves. And, if they're interested, maybe they will. If they're not, then they'll either tell you about their church or nod politely. At worst, you might get a comment about why religious people stink and you can agree that every religious person you know is also someone who gets it wrong sometimes. None of us are perfect. (That's why we need God's grace!)

This fall, we have three separate opportunities for you to invite folks to check out Good Shepherd – outside of worship! These are also opportunities for you to volunteer, to help out, and to engage visitors with your stories and with invitations to learn more about Good Shepherd themselves. The Fall Fest on October 18th, the month of Pumpkin sales, and the Pet Blessing on October 11th are all chances for you to speak from your experience, to reach out to friends and family and neighbors with an invitation, and to – ultimately – open a door for someone new to experience God's love here at Good Shepherd.

Sign-up sheets are in the narthex. Information about these events is in this newsletter and will be in other publications, too. Help out, speak from your heart, and watch the Holy Spirit work through you.



WHAT IS LYME DISEASE?

Lyme disease is an illness caused by Borrelia bacteria. Humans usually contract these diseases from the bite of a tick carrying this bacterium. Ticks that carry Borrelia bacteria live throughout most of the United States. But Lyme disease is common in the upper Midwest.

During warm weather, including summer and fall, people want to walk outside to enjoy the weather and stay physically fit. And this outdoor living at times comes with risk, such as a chance of getting bitten by infectious insects, such as ticks and their bacteria. Individuals are at risk of Lyme disease when they spend time where ticks live, such as grassy, brushy, or wooded areas. BE AWARE OF THESE AREAS.

Disease-related signs and symptoms overlap and look similar. A tick bite may look like a tiny, rash, itchy bump on the skin, much like a mosquito bite, and many people will not notice they have had a tick bite.

The symptoms of Lyme disease vary. They usually show up in stages, and the stages at times overlap, and it is possible that some people may not have the early stages.

Professional medical experts address that early symptoms of Lyme disease may usually happen within 3-30 days after a tick bite, and this is called early localized disease.

EARLY STAGES SYMPTOMS:

Rash, Fever, Headache, Extreme tiredness, Muscle aches and pains, Swollen lymph nodes

HOW IS THIS DISEASE TREATED?

Without treatment, Lyme disease can get worse and spread widely, and this is called disseminated disease.

The advice is that whenever an individual experiences early-stage symptoms, it is wise to seek medical advice as soon as possible, for early diagnosis and proper treatment can improve outcomes.



What are you passionate about? How did you discover that passion?

Teaching through play. I love learning new things about this amazing world God is creating and I can tell there is an excitement inside me that wants to share what I am learning with others. In high school I had friends from another church that invited me to their house for bible study each week. I really enjoyed the fellowship and games with friends but could tell I came most alive when I was given the opportunity to lead a bible study for the group. Ever since then I've relished the creative process of finding exciting and joyful ways of teaching and learning together.

You were recommended by a Al of GSLC. Does that surprise you? What should people know about the community service work/work that you do?

Following God means our lives will always be full of surprises! I've been blessed to be surrounded by a community of disciples at GSLC that has modeled for me what service to our neighbors looks like. I have accompanied many people from GSLC to deliver beds, food, furniture, clothing, flowers, songs, and prayers to others. What I am most excited about and would want GSLC to know is the amazing ways God has transformed my heart when I have leaned into the relationships that have formed from that service work. In other words, I am learning that Jesus doesn't want us to just GIVE stuff to others, Jesus wants us to SHARE life with them. How can we lean into the work we are already doing and actually get to know the people we are taking food, clothes, and furniture to? That is the next step of discipleship that I would want others to know about the community service work God is doing through us.

What is one thing you're deeply grateful for right now?

Through a series of unpredictable events and meetings with people at Leadership Lab, The Crossways Conference, ELCA Extravaganza, and the Theology of Play Conference I was put in touch with people working at Sparkhouse which publishes much of the ELCA's Sunday School and Confirmation Curriculum. What I can only describe as the work of the Holy Spirit has landed me the opportunity to help craft the next wave of Confirmation Curriculum for Sparkhouse. I am extremely grateful for this chance to be playful and creative with how we teach and share the faith.

What about your work (volunteer or paid) is the most fulfilling to you?

As your Director for Evangelical Mission I get to visit congregations all over our synod and bring the joy of Jesus to worship services and evangelism meetings. The Holy Spirit allows me to be an encouraging presence among our siblings in Christ who are wrestling with where God is calling them to serve. I love challenging disciples to reorient their way from a scarcity mentality and a more biblical abundance of God's gifts mindset. Helping Jesus followers live from their baptismal promises, all of which should be good news to our neighbors.

Why are you a part of this congregation?

I continue to break bread with and fellowship with those the Holy Spirit gathers at GSLC because God continues to model Christlike service to our neighbor through those gathered there. I believe GSLC is on an adventure of inviting others into that life giving journey of following Jesus and I want to be a part of that.

What is a favorite memory you have here at GSLC?

Almost getting sent home from a lock-in during middle school because I was hiding in the sanctuary with a friend when I was supposed to be watching a movie in the narthex!
