FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK:

Sitting on the Sidelines



As we head into fall, many folks in our region get excited for a new football season. Whether they're cheering on the Fisher Bunnies or the University of Illinois Fighting Illini at Memorial Stadium, the view from the sidelines can be exciting. And, if you're on the team, then the view from the sidelines can be exhilarating or gut-wrenching, depending on how your team is doing or what play you just made or flubbed.

Sometimes, though, sitting on the sidelines is less a metaphor for a watching great game or being part of a team than it is a metaphor for being left out. Many people with

depression feel like they are on the sidelines of their own life – just watching things happen around them, but not fully participating. Other folks have found themselves sidelined by powers beyond their control: an important project was taken away or given to someone else; a loved-one's diagnosis puts all of the attention on them, making you feel forgotten or your needs go unmet; a decision made by others that affects you directly leaves you reeling. Sitting on the sidelines isn't always a good thing.

Sitting on the sidelines is also a bad idea when our participation is needed. If a player is injured and unable to get out on the field, then their talents and skills are missed on the team. All the team can hope is that they heal quickly and that someone else can fill the gap in the meantime. Now, if that player is simply feeling lazy or doesn't feel like playing, that's a different story. I'm guessing that the coach would have some choice words!

In life, we can be sidelined by others or by circumstances. We can also sideline ourselves. How often have we thought, "I don't want to get involved." or "That's not my problem."? Sometimes that's true; it's not our problem or none of our business. Sometimes, though, our participation is necessary despite our reluctance. The challenge is figuring out the difference.

Recently, the state of Florida decided new standards for the teaching of American History, particularly with regard to the teaching of African American history, the history of slavery, the effects of the institution of slavery, and ongoing racial injustice, prejudice, and inequity. It may surprise you to learn that a few African Americans were included on the committee that made

these decisions. It may not surprise you, however, to discover that their contributions to the discussion were ignored, belittled, or sidelined.

Although this made the news, it is sadly not new. The sidelining of people of color, of parts of history that make some white folks uncomfortable, and even current realities faced by a large percentage of the American population has been practiced for decades.

Which means that we can't sit on the sidelines of this issue. We can't leave this as "someone else's problem" or say we don't want to get involved. For the sake of justice, the sake of our country's future, the sake of what is right and good and Christ-like and loving, we need to stand up and speak up. To not allow, to the best our abilities, the voices of BIPOC (Black, Indigenous, People of Color) people to be silenced or sidelined – for any reason! – but especially when it comes to our collective history.

It's clear that Jesus was someone who stood up for sidelined people. Again and again, he spoke up, got involved, invited in, advocated for. In Jesus' ministry, he continuously and effectively brought sidelined people into the center of the field, holding them up as examples of faith, images of the kingdom of God, and part of God's family: Zacchaeus, the Canaanite woman, children, Mary Magdalene, Matthew and Peter and Thomas, Paul(!), and many others besides.

As followers of this same Jesus, it is my hope that we never sideline others. And that when we do, we confess and repent and seek reconciliation and a better path forward. It's also my prayer that we won't sit on the sidelines ourselves - that we'll be actively engaged in the work of justice, in the life of this congregation and in what God is doing in this place. After all, we're not on the team to sit on the bench!

And, from day to day, whether we're actively engaged in God's work or resting on the sidelines between plays, we will have a front row seat to what the Holy Spirit is doing. And that, my friends, is exciting indeed!

By the way: Getting off the sidelines to advocate for others often starts with learning. There are lots of beautiful ways that you can start educating yourself. Our local library offers a great selection of books about African American history, anti-racism, and white supremacy. There you can find lots of great books, from Ibram X. Kendi's *How to Be an Antiracist* to Layla Saad's *Me and White Supremacy* and Robin DiAngelo's *White Fragility*. I also personally recommend two books also available in our church library: James H. Cone's *The Cross and the Lynching Tree* and Lenny Duncan's *Dear Church*. We also have copies of the 1619 Project articles that were first published in the New York Times.

If you would like to work with any of our groups, please talk to Deacon Jason Fisher. See page 13 of this month's Scroll for curriculum info.






GOD'S WORK – OUR HANDS

JIM HACK MISSION FUND

Many of you are aware of and have been supporters of this meaningful

program Jim Hack and Pastor Velma envisioned years ago. Their idea was simple and straightforward, support youth in the Cristo Rey community and provide funds to allow a student to stay in school. Pastor Velma would manage the fund and help families cover costs of school uniforms, books, tuition, supplies, and food. Estimates were \$30 per month (\$360/Year) would allow a student to attend school and stay on a path to a successful and productive life. Jim had a vision of promoting this program and encouraging GSLC members and friends to support the young people of Cristol Rea with an ongoing effort. Last year you and others donated over 000 to this worthy cause. GSLC sends

\$9,000 to this worthy cause. GSLC sends these funds to Pastor Velma quarterly the first of October, January, April, and July.

Pledges for next year should be completed by September 15th. Please email me your pledge amount or give me a call and I will be able to send Pastor Velma the first quarter allotment around October 1st. The Mission fund was established in 2013, By laws were amended in 2021 to create an additional fund named to honor Jim Hack and provide funds to support future mission trips. This year responding to a proposal to delete duplication, Council renamed the entire account <u>The Jim Hack</u> <u>Mission fund</u>. The committee may designate expenditures for any mission purpose, foreign or domestic.

The Thrivent & Habitat for Humanity partnership remains in place, but international activities were suspended during Covid. As a result, trips to El Salvador were not planned this year. The committee has discussed domestic trips in support of Lutheran Disaster Relief and is open to suggestions from members for specific ideas.

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A small but dedicated group of Good Shepherd members and friends continue to support Pastor Vilma and the Cristol Ray of Hope Scholarship fund at Lutheran Church in Sana Anna. This fund is administered by Pastor Vilma and provides money to assist students and families of the church with tuition, uniforms, books, for students and food for families of the parish.

Topic: Emergency Preparedness Emergencies can happen out of nowhere!

Our ability to survive is often determined by our level of preparation. Help take some of the unknowns out of the unknown by preparing a disaster kit today. Learn what you should include.

September 2023

Basic Disaster Supplies Kit:

To assemble your kit, store items in airtight plastic bags and put your entire kit in one or two easy-to-carry containers such as plastic bins or a duffel bag. A basic emergency supply kit could include the following recommended items:

- <u>Water</u> (one gallon per person per day for several days, for drinking and sanitation)
- <u>Food</u> (at least a several-day supply of non-perishable food)
- Battery-powered or hand crank radio and a NOAA Weather Radio with tone alert
- Flashlight
- First aid kit
- Extra batteries
- Whistle (to signal for help)
- Dust mask (to help filter contaminated air)
- Plastic sheeting and duct tape (to <u>shelter in place</u>)
- Moist towelettes, garbage bags and plastic ties (for personal sanitation)
- Wrench or pliers (to turn off utilities)
- Manual can opener (for food)
- Local maps
- Cell phone with chargers and a backup battery


We shouldn't have to worry here in CU since we're a university town with healthcare, but look at Maui or what about the dust storms in other parts of country.
